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Celebrating 30 years of tertiary scholarship

This month McDonald's celebrates the 30th anniversary of the McDonald's Te Tai Tokerau scholarship, offerred in partnership with Auckland University of Technology (AUT) to broaden the horizons of promising Māori students. The McDonald's scholarship programme is one of the longest running scholarship programmes at AUT, seeing over 100 scholarships awarded to students from Te Tai Tokerau region since 1993.

In 2016, the scholarship programme was extended to the Wairoa-Gisborne region.

At its heart, the McDonald's Te Tai Tokerau scholarship programme is about promoting Māori potential and supporting educational success. The scholarship assists Māori students to gain tertiary qualifications that will assist in the economic, professional and community growth of their hapū.

The programme provides students with a supportive environment in which to enhance and inspire both academic and personal success. Along with financial assistance, the scholarship offers networking opportunities, corporate role models and university support services.

"McDonald's NZ has remained steadfast and unwavering with their support of this programme," says Hariata Mareroa, AUT Te Kaiwhakahaere (Manager), who has been involved for all but two of its 30 years. "McDonald's kept true to the original intent of the programme, academic success although important would not be the only focus, assisting individuals to reach personal and professional goals was as important.

"They understood that many of the recipients would be the first in their families to undertake this journey, that they were leaving their most trusted support structures — whānau — to undertake qualifications in the largest city in Aotearoa and they have always understood that this is a huge undertaking for anyone let alone for the most part an eighteen-year-old.







For 30 years the karahipi has been part and parcel of the managing director's remit, and something that myself and my predecessors feel a connection to and a responsibility to continue.

One of the core strengths of the McDonald's business is the concept of the 'three legged stool'. Not just the scholarship recipients themselves, but also their whānau, the school staff who have fostered awareness and belief in the scholarships, the AUT staff who have evolved the programme over time, and the McDonald's people who hold the scholarships so dear.

I'd like to thank those involved in collecting and sharing the stories and memories in this book. I truly believe the McDonald's Te Tai Tokerau scholarships are an exemplar for how the private and public sector and tangata whenua can work together to drive positive outcomes.
